

### **BREAKING THE CYCLE OF HOPELESSNESS**



Taniya was a student at Wayne Middle School when she enrolled in the Erie City Mission's Youth Ministry program, Urban University. Taniya met Miss Rose and Miss Tracev during a school assembly at the start of her 6th grade year, where they encouraged her to join the program. Seeing the types of courses they were offering she thought it would be a fun experience. Before

Urban University, Taniya admits she was shy and struggled to fit in throughout elementary school and into the start of middle school. "People would pick on me," Taniya shared. Taniya battled with her self-image, spending most of her time at school hiding under the hood of her jacket. "I didn't like showing my skin," she explained. "I would wear a jacket every day, even in hot weather." She was nervous when she started her first week of culinary



For Jaylin, the decision to enroll in Urban University changed his life. Jaylin joined Urban University , at the start of his 6th grade year at Wayne Middle School. He would agree, he wasn't the easiest student to work with. "I was disrespectful," admitted Jaylin. His negative attitude and anger often led him into fights at school and even resulted in a few school suspensions. "Urban

University helped me change," he said. "From the first day I came home [from the program], I knew something was different. I wasn't mad. It wasn't me against the world." Jaylin not only wrestled with anger, he also had a hard time forgiving people and trusting them—a challenge he was forced to explore throughout his 3-year tenure in the program. During his Urban University courses, Jaylin was placed in situations where he had to rely on his peers or an adult mentor to accomplish assignments. But it was through those challenges that Jaylin saw arts and woodworking workshops, but quickly realized this program was different from her school experiences. "Everybody was friendly there. There weren't any mean people and everybody wanted to talk with each other. It was an open space. That's where I got out of my shell and learned how to be myself and be okay with who I was."

Taniya's time in Urban University taught her more than how to cook and build things out of wood. Her experiences throughout the program taught her how to be comfortable in her skin. Today, Taniya holds her head up and goes out of her way to talk to new people. She isn't hiding behind that hood any longer. She felt respected and loved by the mentors and students at Urban University and it challenged her to step out in leadership in her 8th grade year to run for student body president. "I am really thankful that God put this program in my path," she said, "to help kids like me get out of their shells, set goals, and get closer to God."

Taniya graduated from the Urban University program this year, and plans to serve as a Urban University Junior Mentor in the Summer of 2020.

himself grow in maturity and learn how to trust and communicate positively with others. He found himself making real connections with his mentors and peers; he found trust.

Jaylin's change in behavior was a gradual progress, one that took over a year and a half for his mentors and peers to see. "His choices of attitude and behavior were not going to allow him to continue the program if he wasn't willing to change," recalls RoseMarie Lackey, the director of the Urban University program. Jaylin had a decision to make, and his decision changed everything. Throughout his 8th grade year, Jaylin began to transform his attitude. He became more aware of his words and their ability to build people up or tear them down. He began showing respect, acting out of kindness and even went out of his way to be helpful. "If it weren't for Urban University, I would probably be with most of my friends, staying behind and being held back in school," Jaylin said. "I am thankful for the opportunities that Urban University gave me. Thankful that they gave me a chance."

Jaylin graduated from the Urban University program this year, and is enrolled to serve as a Junior mentor in the Fall.


