# **Finding Hope In An Unexpected Place**

Lucille never believed that at her age she would have to start over. It wasn't her plan, but when an electrical fire took everything she had, only a year after the death of her husband, Lucille sought comfort and healing in the most unlikely of places—a thrift store.

"...when you lose so much in such a short amount of time, you know who is in charge [God]," Lucille shares. Unable to return to the home she had shared with her husband for over 61 years, Lucille moved into a new place and began to rebuild her life. She was safe, warm and fed—but this place wasn't home.

In the Summer of 2020, Lucille entered the Erie City Mission's Thrifty Shopper store for the first time looking to buy things for her new house. Having never been thrift shopping, she had assumed the store would be chaotic and unorganized. *"I* think there is a perception that thrift stores are junk stores. That

*is not the case,"* she said. She was surprised and excited to see that the store was clean, nicely laid out and that the items for sale were of quality.

Over the next five months, Lucille was a frequent visitor at the Thrifty Shopper. Every purchase played a role in making her new house a home. "I don't think the City Mission has any clue how their merchandise impacted my life, particularly after the fire. It saved my life in terms of comfort and essentials," Lucille explains. From the basics needed in every home dishes, linens and furniture—to the items that allowed her to display the memories of her past, they each had an important purpose.

"...when you are in your eighties you really don't think about replacing every spoon, dish, bowl and pan that you had for years," Lucille said. "That was huge...and I felt it was time to let them know what that meant to me, and how it gave me

*comfort."* Not looking for any fanfare, Lucille left a letter on the cashier counter on her way out of the store. The letter explained how the Erie City Mission's Thrifty Shopper had helped her to find comfort during a very traumatic and difficult time in her life. The Thrifty Shopper had made her new house a home.

"I am a walking advertisement for the Thrifty Shopper because I am always telling people to go there," she laughed. "Whenever I had any doubt as to why I was buying things there as opposed to someplace else, it was because I always felt that the money was going to help the people who really needed it. That was key to me being there. There is nothing like helping other people...and I am so glad I am in a place now where I can do that."
